

 AKA – wild black raspberry, black caps, black cap raspberry, thimbleberry & Scotch







- Floricane-bearing shrub 4-6 ft tall. Fruit is produced the second summer and then the cane dies.
- Prickly shoots.
- Not a blackberry but related to red raspberry



Insects

- Sap Beetles and Yellow Jackets can be a major problem <u>if</u> overripe fruit accumulates.
- Japanese Beetles can be a serious sporadic problem.
- Raspberry cane borer and crown borer may be a problem.
- Mites may be a problem in hot, dry weather



Diseases - can be a problem

- Verticillium can survive for many years in the soil - don't follow solanacea (tomato, eggplant, pepper, etc.)
- Phytophthora Root Rot
- Viral diseases


Site selection

- Soils
 - Well drained brambles do not like wet sites
 - Good air movement
 - pH of 5.5 6.5
 - 2-4% organic matter, cover crops can help
 - 500' from wild brambles to slow disease spread
 - Avoid sites that were sod the previous year

Planting


- Tissue culture/nursery mature/bare root Buy the best quality you can
- Plant in a 3-4 foot weed free strip
 - Landscape fabric can be used
- Shallow raised bed (3"-6") can help on poorly drained soils



Black Raspberry Trellis



- Produce on 2nd year floricane
- Primocanes tipped in the Spring
- Laterals shortened in late Winter



Variety Selection

- Bristol Early, but smaller berries more potential from damage with a late frost
- Jewel mid-season, larger berries
- Mac Black late season more potential for infestation with SWD
- Munger late season
- Allen very late season


