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COMMUNITY & GARDEN

Community: The people who will be involved in ANY aspect of the garden for ANY length of time.



Garden: The physical area where people interact with the natural environment.



How to Start a

COMMUNITY ********



- 1. Talk to your neighbors
 - Knock on everyone's door within a 3 block radius of the
 - Ask what they'd like to see in the community space
 - Invite them to a potluck to continue brainstorming
- 2. Host a community event!
 - Record what and who people want to see in the community
 - Record how they want to feel in the community space
 - Record what people want to grow in the space
- 3. Hold your first Community Space Meeting
 - Share the results from the event: Tally the ideas and order them starting with most popular
 - Create a plan for next steps!
 - Organizing the group and developing the land
- 4. Organize your group
 - Determine how decisions will be made
 - Develop a community vision
 - Identify leaders for the space
 - Vote on a name for the space

- 1. Look for land
 - Are there already gardens in the neighborhood? If yes, ask yourself why there needs to be another.
- 2. Assess the land
 - Research and document the garden sit e's history - Find out who owns the land and how it was used in the past. How are people using it now?
 - Can the community easily get to the space?
- 3. What type of garden does the community want?
 - Allotment Garden w/ Plots
 - Community Farm ■ Market Farm
 - Other?
- 4. Design the space with the community group, create a budget, track volunteer hours, organize a contact list and begin tracking volunteer hours
- 5. Build and Grow!
 - Schedule and invite neighbors to build days and ongoing workdays through the season
 - Develop garde n participant agreements
 - Hang signage



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FOCUS ON THE COMMUNITY FIRST!

1. Talk to your friends & neighbors!

- Plan on knocking on every door in a 3 block area.
- Ask folks what they would like in a community GREEN SPACE.

2. Host a community event!

- Have a variety of ways for folks to share:
 - Who they want to see in the green space.
 - What they want to feel in the green space.
 - What things they want in a green space.

3. Hold your first community space meeting!

- Share the results of the community visioning activity.
- Brainstorm as a group about next steps.
 - Maybe divide into working groups to focus on specific parts.

4. Organize your group!

- Decide how decisions will be made!
- Develop a shared vision for your community space.





FOCUS ON THE GARDEN SECOND!

1. Look for land.

Are there green spaces close by? If so, ask why you need another one?

2. Assess the land.

- o Find out who owns it & make contact with the owner.
- Learn about past land use.
- Learn about current land use--invite current users to participate.
- Check about infrastructure access (water, buildings, electric, etc.)

3. If a garden is in the plan, decide what type of garden.

- o Allotment garden; cooperative farm/garden; You-pick garden; others...
- 4. Design the space with your community Group.

5. Organize!

- Budget, fundraise, create a land use agreement, volunteer....
- 6. Build & Grow!

COMMON TYPES OF COMMUNITY GARDENS

Allotment Garden:

Common space with individual plots worked and harvested by individual gardeners.



Cooperative Garden:

Common space worked collectively by defined group of people who share in the work and harvest.



You-Pick Garden or Anarchist Garden:

Common space where anyone can work and anyone can harvest, even if they did not work in the garden.

Free Veggies! Help yourself!

TIPS TO KEEP YOUR GARDEN GROWING

FOCUS ON THE COMMUNITY!

- Establish a Leadership Committee!
 - 3-5 people depending on size of garden.
- Establish Shared Actions & Ideals for Community Space!
 - o How are problems solved?
 - o How does shared work happen?
- Hold Regular Garden Meetings!
 - Once/month May-Oct.
 - 1-2 planning meetings in the winter
- Hold Regular Community wide events!
 - o Invite everyone in a 3 block radius.
- Hold Community Work Days!
- Build Partnerships with local businesses, city officials, churches, etc.
